Application process under way soon

The application process is about to be under way for our seniors. Please make sure your child is researching the requirements needed for each individual school and watching deadlines. Teachers need at least two weeks notice in order to write a letter of recommendation. Students also need to request a

transcript using the orange transcript request form that was handed out in Religion class at least two weeks before a deadline date. Additional transcript request forms can be found in the Counseling Office.

In-person and virtual college visits

The Counseling office is hosting in-person and virtual college visits with college admissions representatives. Attending these college visits are a great way to learn more about colleges a student is interested in and be able to connect with the admissions representative. Students can find the schedule of college visits on Naviance and listen to announcements for upcoming visits. Students can get passes for visits from the Counseling Office on the morning of the visit. If a visit is virtual, there will be a link to register for the visit on Naviance.

On this day ...

Monday, Oct. 1: The Free Application for Federal Student Aid opens up to students and their parents. Now is the time to apply for financial aid. First go to www.studentaid.ed.gov to sign up for a Federal Student Aid ID for both the parent and student. Scroll to the bottom of the page and click on "The FSA ID." Then go to www.fafsa.ed.gov to fill out the FAFSA application. If you have questions when filling out the FAFSA feel free to call Mrs. Schoeneck or Ms. Doyle in the Counseling Office. It is recommended that FAFSA applications be filed by February 15 for the best financial aid possible. Some colleges also require that a student fills out a **CSS Profile** which is the financial aid application for certain private schools. You can do this on College Board's website- www.collegeboard.org. They will have a list of all the schools that require this application.

Wednesday, Oct. 13 is our day for the juniors to sit for the PSAT exam. A separate letter will be sent to parents of Juniors with more information.



One Family's Experience With the International Baccalaureate Program

M

y child, Stephanie, attended Washington International School, an all IB school in Washington, D.C., for her middle and high school education (www.wis.edu). As I think about what attracted her and us to that school in particular I'm remembering her earliest education choices as they paved the way to the future ones, including college. I will share these experiences with the reader before getting to what we found so valuable in the IB Program.

From my experiences as a student in a country other than my own, as an employee in industries that were foreign to me, as an educator, I came to learn that to have effective relationships with others as well as to help others and myself develop, it was imperative to regard each person as an individual, with their own specific abilities, experiences, life views and visions, and needs for reaching their full potential -- as learners, as contributors to the well-being of themselves, their families, their communities and the world community. I came to see that ability is not hereditary but rather acquired through the care given by parents, teachers, colleagues and the work of the employee and student themselves.

And so I approached raising our child the same way, with few assumptions about what she wanted other than love and care. When she was two years old I sensed she wanted to be with a group of children in both a social and an education setting. I looked at a wide variety of pre-K public and private schools in D.C. and narrowed them down from 15 to three. I had my husband take our daughter to the three schools and asked him to not express his opinion to her of any of them but rather to witness her choice among them. It was a clear choice for her. When she got to the Montessori school, she ran into the classroom and didn't want to leave. And so at 2 ½ she started at that school, at which she was so very happy to be free to learn of her own accord and supported in her independence.

Not too long after that, around age 4, Stephanie expressed interest in learning to play the violin. A local arts workshop

where she had attended summer camp had a Suzuki violin program. In educating myself about that method of teaching, I read a book by Shin'ichi Suzuki titled *Where Love Is Deep* and discovered that his idea of raising children to reach their full potential corresponded to what I had learned through Stephanie's Montessori experience: that one has to stimulate their growth by "fostering [them] as fine human beings" – i.e., love -- through the culture of their learning environment. Again, Stephanie took to the violin as she had to the independent Montessori way of learning.

At sixth grade it was time to search for a middle school that would support her as the independent learner she was, curious about different cultures and ways of thinking and subjects. In D.C. that meant again visiting with Stephanie a wide variety of schools both public and private. The three of us chose seven and Stephanie narrowed it down to two, one of which was Washington International School. The attraction there for her was the representation of 76 countries among the students. I and my husband were particularly taken by the fact that the majority of the faculty had advanced degrees as well as by the school's mission – "to be an exemplary learning community — enriched by differences, informed through inquiry, global in reach" – and by its core values – inquiry-based learning, global perspective and, in particular, individual responsibility. These all proved to be true in practice



VEX Robotics and First Lego League

Bishop Ludden is returning to live play in VEX Robotics and First Lego League. The VEX squad is the high school team. The VEX team will play in two tournaments this winter.

The FLL team is for our junior high squad. They will compete in the Regional Qualifier, then head to the championships if they qualify. According to First Lego League's website, "FIRST LEGO League Challenge teams prepare all season to compete at regional tournaments, where judges provide valuable feedback on their robot, code, and invention. The final test of their work comes at the Robot Game table, where they race against the clock for a personal best score and the chance to advance to a local championship. Some teams earn an invitation to FIRST Championship, where teams from all over the world meet and compete. FIRST LEGO League Challenge event timelines and registration process vary by region." Both teams are coached by Maxine Babcock and mentored by Andrew Leary.



Quiz Bowl

Bishop Ludden's Quiz Bowl teams are taking at least a year off from MasterMinds play after winning both the NY and Regional titles in 2020-21. That team also took home the seventh place trophy at the Small School National Championship Tournament.

The entire varsity team graduated and this will be a rebuilding year for the program. Bishop Ludden has at least three tournament ready teams of 4-6 ; the squads will be heading to the Ithaca Fall Tournament on November 20.

The prospective 2022-23 SSNCT group of younger players will be heading to Philadelphia for the Philly Fall Invitational on Oct. 30. The teams are coached by Maxine Babcock.

STEM Club to enter Esports



Bishop Ludden Stem Club will be entering Esports with Rocket League teams. The three player teams (as many as we choose to field) will be coached by Maxine Babcock and top 100 in world play Isaiah Horne. Our signups are this week and this counts as a varsity sport. The Fall season runs from Oct. 1 through November. Bishop Ludden (reigning NY champions) will be opting out of MasterMinds this year to focus on History Bowl and Bee play and NAQT sponsored tournaments.



What to know about senior portraits—Due Oct. 15

Seniors may have portraits taken outside of school to be submitted for print in the yearbook. Portraits must be emailed to rhenderson@syrdiocese.org and must adhere to the following guidelines.

- ⇒ Portraits must be a close-up from the waist or chest up; no full body portraits
- ⇒ We only use vertical portrait images
- ⇒ Backgrounds should be plain and not detract from the student; if the student is next to a tree, brick wall, or other item, the focus should be the student's face
- ⇒ No sunglasses or hands obscuring parts of a student's face
- ⇒ No props, pets, or other faces
- ⇒ Students must be wearing school-appropriate clothing; no hats or hoods
- ⇒ All files must be submitted as JPEGs
- ⇒ Original digital copy is preferred; the higher the resolution, the better
- ⇒ Do not submit screenshots, selfies, or pictures from cell phones or social media
- ⇒ We reserve the right to crop a photo as necessary
- ⇒ Any images that do not meet the specifications listed above will be asked to submit a new photo

The deadline to submit a senior portrait is **Friday, Oct. 15**. Failure to submit an acceptable senior portrait will result in the use of the portrait taken on school picture day.



Extended family and friends can also order through your student, earning your family even more credit toward tuition!

How does buying a SCRIP generate revenue?

You order your SCRIP gift cards through the school and pay full face value for them. Bishop Ludden is able to buy SCRIP from hundreds of local and nationwide retailers through the Great Lakes Scrip Center at a discount. The discount, which varies from 1.5% to 25%, is returned to you as tuition credit for the following school year.

For example, if you purchase a \$50 gift card from a retailer that is offering a 10% discount, you have already saved \$5 on next year's tuition bill.

If you're planning a shopping trip to Target or a dinner at Cheesecake Factory, plan ahead and shop with SCRIP! Earn money back in the process — it really adds up. Families have earned hundreds of dollars towards their tuition bills.

How do I order SCRIP?

Download and complete an order form. There is a one time \$20 set-up fee paid annually, which covers shipping costs. Send the order to school with your student on the due date (always on a Monday) and the rest is up to our SCRIP coordinator. Your SCRIP order is returned to you or your student at school the Friday of the same week.

throughout Stephanie's experience there. I was particularly grateful that the IB exams were reviewed and graded by examiners throughout the world and therefore unconnected to the school. In fact it prompted me to become an IB examiner in French.

The IB academic program with the goal of obtaining the IB Diploma was both scary for its breadth and rigor, and a very attractive goal. When I asked Stephanie recently, now in her 30s, how she would describe her experience with it, she said: "You'll be grateful in your later years for the well-rounded education you had and how it opened your eyes **unlike any other education**, and at the same time you'll never forget how traumatizing it is for its difficulty but you'll be **proud of surviving it through studying**." She also cherished that she could choose her focus with the six subjects the IB requires instead of being forced to take subjects she didn't want to take. In addition, the Theory of Knowledge course was, to her, "very important for understanding questions and thoughts that aren't brought up otherwise, for learning how society dictates thoughts and then being able to question it all."

Stephanie thinks of the Extended Essay requirement as a great experience for becoming self-guided in something so extensive over a period of months, and being able to choose your topic as well as your teacher-sponsor. She also found the community service requirement of great value and is still connected to the communities in which she served. Her longest experience volunteering was at the National Zoo and several years ago she developed a pig and steer farm where she lives to raise good food for


