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COUNSELING

For Juniors: You have completed the PSAT, what now? Score reports will be sent to the Counseling Office in late December. If students have not set up their College Board account, please do so. Through this account you will be able to register for an upcoming SAT exam as well as utilize it for test prep and a different college and career search program. Go to www.collegeboard.org and www.actstudent.org to view the schedule of exams and to register.

Which one is right for you? See below.

Test Structure:

SAT: Reading, Writing & Language, Math, Essay (optional)

ACT: English, Math, Reading, Science Reasoning, Essay (optional)

Length:

SAT: 3 hours (without essay); 3 hours, 50 minutes (with essay)

ACT: 2 hours, 55 minutes (without essay); 3 hours 40 minutes (with essay)

Reading:

SAT: 5 reading passages

ACT: 4 reading passages

Science:

SAT: None

ACT: One science section testing your critical thinking skills (not your specific science knowledge).

Math:

SAT: Covers arithmetic, algebra I & II, geometry, trigonometry and data analysis.

ACT: Covers Arithmetic, algebra I & II, geometry, trigonometry, and probability & statistics.

Calculator Policy:

SAT: Some math questions don't allow you to use a calculator.

ACT: You can use a calculator on all math questions.

Essays:

SAT: Optional. The essay will test your comprehension of a source text.

ACT: Optional. The essay will test how well you evaluate and analyze complex issues.

How it's Scored:

SAT: Scored on a scale of 400-1600.

ACT: Scored on a scale of 1-36.

Why take it?

Colleges use SAT and ACT scores for admissions and merit-based scholarships.




Something else for juniors to be thinking about is starting to research colleges. All juniors have a Naviance account that was created as a sophomore and that program will supply you with the tools to do an advanced college search based on some factors specific to you such as location, size, athletics and majors to name a few. If you aren't ready to research colleges because you have no idea what major you want to pursue, then you can do a career search or personality inventory through Naviance. Now is a great time to be going on college visits to see what specific qualities are important to you in your future home away from home. The more research you do now as a junior, the less work you will have as a senior, so get started now! Begin to look online (www.actstudent.org and www.collegeboard.org) and plan when you want to take the SAT or ACT so you can find a date that fits your schedule best. There are test dates November-June depending on which one you want to take. Be aware of deadlines so you aren't paying extra fees.

For seniors

For Seniors: Please make sure your child is researching the requirements needed for each individual college and watching deadlines. Teachers, Mrs. Schoeneck, and Miss Doyle need at least 2 weeks notice to write a letter of recommendation. Students also need to request a transcript using the orange transcript request form that was handed out in Religion class at least 2 weeks before a deadline date. Extra copies of the transcript request form are available in the Counseling Office. Students need to notify Mrs. Schoeneck or Miss Doyle of specific deadline dates and whether it is an early action or early decision application.

STEM Stars Tout BL STEM Club

STEM stars Payton Campbell, Ryan Skanes, Olivia Smith, and Anthony Taylor represented the Bishop Ludden STEM Club at the October Open House. Payton, a freshman, discussed Quiz Bowl and History Bowl and explained how the games work to prospective students.

Bishop Ludden will be hosting the Varsity and JV History Bowl on Dec. 17. Bishop Ludden will repeat as regional host of the Elementary and Middle School History, Science, and Geography Bees (date to be determined). The Quiz Bowl Squads have tournaments online "in" Texas and a live tournament in Ithaca on Nov. 19.

Junior Ryan is one of Science Olympiad C Division's captains. He discussed the many medals won by the teams in both junior and senior high divisions in the highly competitive Midstate regionals. The junior high team headed to the state championship last year and plans to repeat. The team heads to a December invitational in Liverpool and then to regionals in March, with states in April.

Olivia Smith discussed the competitions in both Rockets and Drones. Bishop Ludden sends six rocket teams to the CNY Rocket Team Challenge each June. The Gaelic Knights took two high school awards and Olivia's team won the award for highest apogee. BL did the SPOC Drone challenge last year and will be competing in the BAAN drone challenge which deals with the biomimicry of drones.

Anthony, a freshman who also captains the B-level Science Olympiad team, discussed the Gaelic Knights eSports program. The team was 25th in NYS in Rocket League in 2021 and currently competes in Rocket League, Super Smash Bros, and Splatoon.

It was a very productive day for the Bishop Ludden - Peter Smith was a book prize winner for the day, with a top 10 individual player finish. The A team took four victories and the B team players scored a lot of points and worked on game skills. The A team missed qualifying for nationals by one question. Great job by A Team Captain Brigid Hardick, Peter, Isaiah Apps, and Paul Owens. The B team was captained by Jon Daher, with Ryan Skanes, Mary Papini, and Lily Janowski. Mary and Lily played live for the first time. The team was coached by Maxine Babcock; she moderated and read a room for all nine rounds. Parents Cheryl Hardick and Daniel Smith drove and chaperoned.

Trip highlights included peak tree season across three states, a visit to Saratoga Springs and its history museum, and a very interesting stay at D Acres in New Hampshire. The not-for-profit educational site was a very a "off-the grid" experience with indoor composting toilets.



Tami earned 3rd place in a Xulon Press writing competition over the summer. Xulon Press is a Christian publishing company. While the names have been changed, the story is true.

I knew it before I knew it. Call it women's intuition or maternal instinct, maybe. But when I looked, I was still delightfully — stunned. Two lines. Two lines. Two lines.

I woke up my husband and showed him. He lifted his sleep mask from his eyes to see, then responded cautiously. "It's still really early," he said.

That didn't deter me from spreading the news. I put the long-awaited two-line stick in a brown paper bag and with a bounce in my step, skipped to my parent's house — a one-minute walk away. They greeted me at the door, wondering what exactly I was so excited to tell them. When they looked in the bag, their emotions were a combination of surprise, disbelief maybe, and concern. I was 44 years old but felt like I was 30. Those first moments were the biggest high for me.

My sister came with me for my first appointment to confirm the pregnancy; Teo was traveling for work. After the exam, the doctor sat down and told me I had a very large uterine fibroid, which, with no uncertain terms, would affect my pregnancy. If I were to carry to term — and that was a BIG IF — I would be in tremendous pain. There was a very good chance I would miscarry. "Don't tell anyone at this point," he said. I snickered, of course, picturing my brown paper bag swinging back and forth as I ran to tell my parents. "I'm serious," he said.

That night I went home and sobbed. And sobbed and sobbed. I sobbed the next day and night, and the next day and night. There was no consoling me. I switched practices almost immediately and was comforted over the phone by a sweet voice who welcomed me as a new patient. They were well-versed in pregnancies with older moms and didn't even sound the alarms when I told them my age. And so, the journey began.

We told our two newly-adopted older children (our daughter was 12, our son, 6) about the little one on the way. Leidy was ecstatic with the news, Sergio not so much in the beginning. He only liked the "word" baby, he told me when I asked him what he thought.

My appointments came and went. Not once did I feel pain while carrying my baby. The fibroid was still there. The doctors could feel it. It was big. But it caused no issues. I didn't even experience morning sickness. My cravings were gulping big, tall glasses of cold milk and sipping on soda through a straw.

Eventually, I did develop gestational hypertension, which was controlled with medication. Mom and I shopped for two outfits — one for a girl and one for a boy — to have wrapped by a retail clerk for our gender reveal party later that evening. I knew I was having a boy. Not because I

peeked and saw "boy" scribbled on the paper, but because I just knew — just like when I knew before I knew.

I had always believed I'd have three children — two boys and a girl. I just never dreamed they'd all come at once. Within a year and a half, I was blessed to be the mom of a pre-teen, a six-year-old, and a newborn. Our ways are not God's ways, and though we may not always understand what's going on, or the why's or the when's, I've learned it's always best to set aside what we think should happen, to allow for what God knows is best to happen. When you let go and let God, you'll never be let down.






