


As you sit before the manger, what is it saying to you?

"It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas, everywhere you go ..." These words came to my mind as I began to write this column for the Catholic Sun edition that will be published on the Thursday before Christmas. As I reacquainted myself with the lyrics of this Christmas song written by songwriter Meredith Willson, I was struck by its fifth verse:

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas
Soon the bells will start
And the thing that will make 'em ring is the carol that you
sing
Right within your heart.

In fact, the Psalm responses for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day invite us to do exactly what these lyrics suggest: to sing out and announce God's goodness and the joy of salvation that Christ's birth brings to our world! As Psalm 98:1 proclaims: "Sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done wondrous deeds; his right hand has won victory for him, his holy arm."

Yes, the marvelous deeds of our God! These are the gifts you and I are invited to unwrap this Christmas. One might wonder how we are to do so? What I would suggest is to do something I consider one of my favorite things to do — to sit before the manger scene and let it speak to me! What is God saying to me and to the rest of the human family in the events that surround Christ's birth, and in the people and places that are part of it?

In his 2019 Apostolic Letter, *Admirabile Signum*, on the meaning and importance of the nativity scene, Pope Francis writes:


"The enchanting image of the Christmas crèche, so dear to the Christian people, never ceases to arouse amazement and wonder. The depiction of Jesus' birth is itself a simple and joyful proclamation of the mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God. The nativity scene is like a living Gospel rising up from the pages of sacred Scripture. As we contemplate the Christmas story, we are invited to set out on a spiritual journey, drawn by the humility of the God who became man in order to encounter every man and woman. We come to realize that so great is his love for us that he became one of us, so that we in turn might become one with him" (#1).

The Holy Father goes on to say:

"Why does the Christmas crèche arouse such wonder and move us so deeply? First, because it shows God's tender love: the Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness. The gift of life, in all its mystery, becomes all the more wondrous as we realize that the Son of Mary is the source and sustenance of all life. In Jesus, the Father has given us a brother who comes to seek us out whenever we are confused or lost, a loyal friend ever at our side. He gave us his Son who forgives us and frees us from our sins" (#3).

evokes a number of the mysteries of Jesus' life and brings them close to our own daily lives" (#2).

Indeed, the closeness of our God, that is what is at the heart of the Christmas celebration! And yet, you and I are invited to consider in this moment our own closeness to God and neighbor in response to the two Great Commandments we are called to observe as disciples of the Lord Jesus:

"The first is this: 'Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these" (Mk 12:29-31).

I can't help but wonder how different the world could be if in the coming new year, I really started to sing from the heart the new song that the cry of the Babe of Bethlehem brought into our world. A common sentiment is how we wish our world would change for the better! Yet, it seems that we look at it from the point of view as "something out there" — not necessarily having anything to do with me!

There are some who even want to blame God and religion for what is wrong with the world, while ignoring the simple fact that it is the human person trying to play God and overlooking what God has said, that is the real source of all the world's troubles. As one Christmas greeting I received reminded me: "When it seems that despair dominates and darkness reigns, the Lord becomes one of us. Enlightens and sanctifies. Liberates and heals. Gives life and restores hope. God is close. God is with us!" In other words, we have the remedy, are we willing to take or use it?

It is hard to believe, but this is my last printed column for the year 2023. Therefore, I want to take this opportunity to thank the many readers who offer me such encouragement in having a regular column in The Catholic Sun. I wish to them and all the faithful of this Diocesan Church my prayerful best wishes for a blessed and merry Christmas! It is also my prayer for 2024, that you and I will teach the world to sing the new song the child of Bethlehem brings with his birth!

Joy, Peace, and Love this Christmas and into the New Year!

Finally, in words that connect us so intimately to the Eucharistic Revival that is ongoing here in the United States, the Pope notes:

"Coming into this world, the Son of God was laid in the place where animals feed. Hay became the first bed of the One who would reveal himself as 'the bread come down from heaven' (Jn 6:41). Saint Augustine, with other Church Fathers, was impressed by this symbolism: 'Laid in a manger, he became our food' (Sermon 189, 4). Indeed, the nativity scene

2023 Bishop Ludden A has best finish in program history



The Geneva Quiz Bowl Invitational is in the books for Bishop Ludden. All four teams worked to take as many points as possible from the competitors. The A Team finished #1 in prelims (the first time in program history) because of this strategy, finishing number two overall after a tough loss to Ithaca A in round eight of the championship bracket. The A team was 8-2 overall, with Peter Smith taking the All-Star Individual Award as the tourney's top player. Peter scored 515 total points in the seven preliminary games and 185 total in the three championship games. Bishop Ludden B was 2-1 in consolation playoffs with Payton Campbell named as a book prize winning All-Star. Bishop Ludden C's Zander Craner was the number 5 player in prelims and was named an All-Star Book Prize winner.

Team members Captain Alex Ewaynk, senior Peter Smith, Momin Naveed, and Mya Barnaba qualified the A Team for NAQT's High School Nationals Championship Tournament for the second straight tournament and Small Schools National Championship Tournament, Open Division for the fourth straight tournament. Sophomore Momin Naveed was on the A Team for the first time this season and scored 210 points. Freshmen Mya Barnaba and Alex Ewanyk scored 145 points each in the tournament. "Peter is such a dominant player, it's difficult for our other players to get on the board. This combination of players had our best-balanced scoring of the season. We have been moving our rising players on different team combos to let them thrive and score," explained Head Coach Maxine Babcock. "We've been prepping them for a 2026 SSNCT run for the top prize."

The B Team scoring was led by All-Star Payton Campbell's 375 and Theresa Quigley's 185. The pair rotated from the A Team to give Momin and Mya a chance to start on the A Team. Molly Smith added 155, while Ryan Skanes had an even 100. The C Team was led by All-Star Zander Craner's 345, while Liv and Julia Smith added 130 and 50 respectively. The young D Team scored a total of 350 points against the more experienced teams with Caitlyn Coryell having her best tournament ever with 190 points. Gabriella Berry scored 110 and eighth grader Noor Naveed scored 50 as the only junior high player in the tournament.

The teams focus on Science Olympiad and History Bowl for the next three months before deciding which national championships to attend in the spring. The teams are coached by Maxine Babcock, Susie Moon Davis, and Grace Babcock.

Bishop Ludden eSports makes playoffs for first time

Bishop Ludden eSports teams had their best records in the program's three-year history. Captain Peter Smith, Hayden Parkhurst (both are founding members of the program and have played all three years), Julia Smith, Aidan Bush, and Zander Craner finished #12 in PLayVS New York Region Rocket League and made the playoffs for the first time in our three-year history. Hayden Parkhurst was a weekly all-star in score per game four times, while Peter Smith was a weekly all-star in goals per shot. The team dropped to Washingtonville in the Sweet 16 Bracket.

Bishop Ludden's PLayVS Mario Kart 8 Deluxe squad missed the playoffs by one match, finishing 15/31 in the Eastern League. Bishop Ludden Gaelic Knights match record was 4-4. The team competed for the first time this year and had a winning game record of 9 - 8. Team Members were led by Captain Ben Gentile, with Alex Gentile, Dawson McCann, Olivia Smith, Anthony Taylor, Brady Davis, Patrick Coleman, and Ryan Skanes.

The Gaelic Knights' PLayVS Northeastern Region Splatoon™ 3 also missed playoffs by one match, in the team's second year in the league, finishing at #17/40 with a match record of 4-4. Team Members were Captains Peter Smith and Ben Gentile, Olivia Smith, Ryan Skanes, Anthony Taylor, Dawson McCann, Brady Davis, Alex Gentile, Kira Ray, and Patrick Coleman.

Bishop Ludden fielded two teams in PlayVS - New York Region Super Smash Bros.™ Ultimate in our second year in the league. At #58/79, the Bishop Ludden Smash Brothers had a Match Record of 3 - 5 and a Series Record 11 - 15, Game Record 25 - 31. Team Members Patrick Coleman, Dawson McCann, Alex Gentile, Olivia Smith, Ryan Skanes, and Brady Davis competed in the head-to-head competition. At #63/79 Bishop Ludden Gaelic Knights finished with a match record of 2-6 and a series Record of 8-18, with a game record of 23-28. Team Members were Peter Smith, Ben Gentile, and Anthony Taylor.

The teams are coached by Maxine Babcock.



A tribute to my friend, her life, and her faith

For many people, the holiday months are not always the easiest, nor are they the happiest.

In November, I found myself grieving over the untimely and unexpected death of my best friend, Lisa Scott, who was more like a sister to me. We'd known each other since we were very young, our families having known each other for generations.

Lisa was one of a kind. She has been described as a bright light and incredibly inspiring. She lived what she believed and was so eager to share her love of God and His constant goodness. I believe she lived her life much like how it reads in Matthew 5:16. "Don't shine so that others can see you. Shine so that through you, others can see Him."

She was rooted by her deep faith and love for our Lord Jesus Christ. She'd often say she was on fire for Jesus. She was heavily involved with the linked parishes of Christ the King Church and Pope John XXIII and was an essential part of their ministry team.

I share Lisa with you so you understand what her perspective was of life after death, which I hope will ignite or reignite your passion for and belief of God's promises. Especially during times of grief and uncertainty.

There's a conversation that we had a few months ago at my sister's house that has stood out in my mind since it took place, and I spoke about it at her funeral mass, too. There were a few of us in the kitchen talking about the unexpected death of the actor, Treat Williams. I was retelling the details of his day—what I knew from social media anyway—how he had posted a video of his farmland and that there was nothing like the smell of fresh mown hay. Hours later, he was killed in a motorcycle accident. I was sad about it all and made the comment that "he was having such a good day." And without missing a beat, Lisa said, "and then his day just got better."

When we grieve over the passing of a loved one, I hope we too can find comfort in those words: "Their day just got better."

To me, it helps to know that not only are they no longer suffering, but they are joyful and basking in the warm embrace of our Savior's love.
