

Ludden names new principal

In a May letter to members of the Bishop Ludden Community, it was announced that Mr. Michael McAuliff will be the school's next principal. Please read below:

Many of you are aware that Leo Cosgrove announced his retirement as principal on March 23, 2021. He will end his time with us at the end of this academic year. Under Leo's leadership, the school has strengthened its programs, with the main achievement becoming a member school of the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program. Thank you Leo for your guidance over the past four years.

The School's Board of Trustees assembled a search committee to find our next principal who will carry on and enhance the successes we have seen over the past several years. We had many qualified candidates from which to choose. The committee conducted interviews with several candidates and presented the top candidate to the Board for what was their unanimous approval. We are excited to announce that Mr. Michael McAuliff will be our next principal of Bishop Ludden Jr/Sr High School, effective July 1, 2021.

Mr. McAuliff comes to us from St. Margaret's School in Mattydale, where he has served as principal since July 2018.

Over Michael's 35 years in education, he has held positions as assistant middle school principal, assistant high school principal and elementary school principal. He is currently serving as the president of the Marcellus Central School District Board of Education. Michael serves as a lector and is a communicant of St. Francis Xavier parish in Marcellus along with his family—wife Kim, a senior director of advancement at Le Moyne College and his two sons Max, a senior at St. Bonaventure University and Jack a sophomore at the University of Hartford.

As we continue to advance the shared mission of Bishop Ludden, each of our Catholic Schools and our local Catholic Church, we recognize that we must be successful in providing an excellent academic program, be team focused and, most importantly, do so within a faith-filled environment. The hiring of Michael McAuliff will help advance that mission. Your continued commitment and desire to be part of our shared mission is important to all of us at Bishop Ludden Jr/Sr High School and the Diocese of Syracuse.

Meet Carol Rojek ('78), proud mom of upcoming graduate

Why did I choose Bishop Ludden for my child?

Catholic education has always been a part of my life. My late brother and I both went to Sacred Heart School as children and then moved to Bishop Ludden for our high school years. For my parents, Catholic school was the only choice. My husband and I share my parents' commitment to Catholic education. For us, Catholic schools not only provide a quality academic foundation, but also solid moral development and an educational experience that helps to fully prepare you for the future. This was exactly what we wanted for our daughter Francesca. She is a proud graduate of Holy Family School and for junior and senior high; we believed that Bishop Ludden was the best choice for her. Francesca is currently a senior with just a few short weeks to graduation.

What's the best feedback you've received from your child about their time at Ludden?

The first piece of feedback I received from Francesca was on her first day at Ludden. As a parent on the first day at a new school, you are always a little nervous. You just hope that everything worked out, that they were able to open their locker with no problem and found all of their classes. I could not wait to ask her how the first day went when I came home from work. Her answer was the best one I could have imagined. She simply stated that "*I loved it.*" For the next six years, I continued to hear the same answer. Francesca felt at home at Ludden. This feeling allowed her to experience everything Ludden had to offer. She was consistently on principal's list for academic achievement, she was involved in student government, she was a member of STEM and Concert Choir, and her greatest experiences were found in the drama department. She performed in every play and school musical since the seventh grade. Ludden allowed her to find her passion.

What do you love most about Ludden?

There are many things I love about Ludden, but the one that stands out for me is the fact that I never worried about my daughter at Ludden. The school is small enough that everyone knows who your child is. The faculty and staff look out for them. They truly take the time to get to know each and every student. Ludden does not allow any student to get lost. They care about the academic aspect of your child's experience. You witness teachers and staff that go the extra mile to coach, chaperone and supervise activities so your child can experience every possible component of a high school experience. Learning is a key element but not all learning comes from books and the classroom. You can learn just as much from the stage and the field. Ludden provides those opportunities.

In what ways have you seen your child grow at Ludden?

Francesca has always been a great student, but her Ludden experience has brought it to new heights. I have watched her create power point presentations for her classes that were truly outstanding. These kids are so advanced in technology. They are encouraged to be fearless and try new things. Ludden definitely challenges their students and the kids accept the challenge.

You see them grow throughout the six years, but you really see the results in senior year. Francesca applied to 10 different colleges during her search and was accepted to all 10 with some impressive scholarship and award packages. This is what solidifies the fact that Ludden was the right choice. Francesca's personal growth has been so amazing to watch. The environment that Ludden provides has allowed her to develop into the person she is meant to be. She has been a part of everything from Student Council to Campus Ministry. She has organized school events and ministered class retreats. She found a home on the stage and had the opportunity to sing in front of New York City actors on a concert choir trip. She has truly made the most of her time at Bishop Ludden.

What would you say to families thinking about enrolling their child at Bishop Ludden?

The one thing I would say to any family thinking about choosing Bishop Ludden is give your child the opportunity to be the best version of themselves and make Ludden your choice. Bishop Ludden will provide your child with a safe and secure environment where they can grow academically, spiritually, emotionally and socially. You will not regret this decision. The past year has proven the power of Catholic schools. They transitioned to virtual learning during the pandemic and kept students engaged in their studies. This past September, they started the year five days a week and continued throughout with in person learning. Bishop Ludden, like all of our Catholic schools, is able to get things done. Former BL teacher celebrates 50 years as a SOSF

Last month, *The Catholic Sun* published a feature, "Celebrating Jubilarians." Below is an excerpt about Sister Margaret Patrick Fay.

Sister Margaret Patrick Fay, OSF, is celebrating 50 years as a Sister of St. Francis of the Neumann Communities. Born in Syracuse she entered community in 1970 and permanently professed in 1976.



Sister Margaret Patrick earned a bachelor's degree in biology from the Catholic University of America and a master's degree in Biology from The College of St. Rose. She also holds a New York State Teaching Certificate for grades 7-12, biology, chemistry, earth science, and general science. She ministered as a teacher at Assumption and Bishop Ludden schools in Syracuse and St. Francis School in Hoboken, New Jersey. For 12 years, Sister Margaret Patrick ministered as the administrator for the Alverna Heights Spirituality and Nature Center in Fayetteville, where she initiated a day camp. For some 20 summers, she served as a coordinator at Family Nature Camp at College of the Atlantic in Bar Harbor, Maine.

"God has been so good to me. All these 50 years, I've been fortunate to be in great ministries and live with great sisters," she said.

Tremont (BL class of '74) recently retired as CEO from SRC Inc. after 35 years with the not-for-profit research and development company. Bishop Ludden 1968-'69 "GREEN MACHINE" Basketball Team

The 1968-69 Bishop Ludden High School Boys' Basketball team that came to be known as "The Green Machine" put together an amazing 21-0 record – a feat never accomplished in the 44-year history of the Syracuse City League (and later the Central New York Cities League).

Ludden Coach Terry Quigley who started the boys' basketball program from its infancy in 1963 and brought the team to the Number 1 NYS ranked team a mere five years later. The team won games by an average of 21 points and defeated four-time defending NYS Diocesan champ Utica Notre Dame by 30 points in the playoffs on its way to a truly remarkable undefeated season.



Quigley inductee



You can't tell the story of Bishop Ludden Junior-Senior High School basketball without mentioning

Terrence "Terry" Quigley.

Coach Quigley started the boys' basketball program at Bishop Ludden High School from its infancy in 1963. Quigley's unblemished 1968-69 team became known as the "Green Machine" as it became the No. 1-ranked high school team in New York State and accomplished a feat never accomplished in the 44-year history of the Syracuse City League by going undefeated. The Gaelic Knights won games by an average of 21 points that season. and brought the team to the Number 1 ranking in New York State in 1968-69.

Terry grew up in Syracuse and attended Central High. He attended and graduated from Syracuse University. During his attendance he played guard for Syracuse basketball for three seasons. While at the university was roommates with gridiron football player who was the first African American to win the Heisman Trophy, Ernie Davis. Davis and Quigley would be close friends during their lives, and Quigley was a groomsman at Davis' wedding.


Quigley would be a successful high school teacher and coach following graduation. He was Bishop Ludden's first basketball coach and would coach the team from 1963 to 1973 with a 124-56 record. Quigley would coach at Westhill for one season, before moving on to Bishop Grimes from 1978 to 1984, with an 80-37 record. He would leave Bishop Grimes to coach a Morrisville State

John Johnstone



If your last professional contract was with the San Francisco Giants for seven figures, it is likely that you are best known for your ability on the baseball diamond.

But 25 years ago, John Johnstone also "had game" on the basketball court. A Liverpool native, John scored 24 points against CBA as Bishop Ludden recorded a 22-3 mark and reached the finals of the New York State Public High School Athletic Association tournament.

While at Onondaga Community College,

he was drafted in the 20th round by the New York Mets. John climbed the Mets' minor league ladder – highlighted by sparkling back-to-back seasons in 1989 at Pittsfield (11-2, 2.77 earned run average) and 1990 at St. Lucie (15-6, 2.24 ERA). He was a Florida State All-Star selection in 1990. He had an overall minor league record of 56-50.

Selected by Florida in the second round of the National League expansion draft (31st overall pick), John spent all or parts of eight big league seasons with the Marlins, Astros, A's, and Giants. The righthander won his first big league game in 1994. As a reliever in the majors, he compiled an overall record of 15-19, 4.01 ERA, 3 saves,

234 appearances, and had a 2-to-1 strikeout to walk ratio.

John's best seasons in the bigs were with San Francisco – 6-5, 3.07 ERA, 70 appearances in 1998, and 4-6, 2.60 ERA, 3 saves, 62 appearances in '99. That is 132 outings in consecutive seasons.

He signed a lucrative contract with the Giants in 2000 for \$1,175,000, but late that season a fractured back required surgery and his career was cut short. Now retired, John spent a few years as the pitching coach for Baldwinsville High School. John and his wife Lori are the parents of 15-year-old daughter Ava. They live in Baldwinsville.

Jim Roy



Since 1975, Jim Roy has built a reputation for being one of Central New York's top golfers. Not only has he etched his name into many amateur record books, he has also earned honors as a professional competitor on the PGA tour.

Roy's golf career began at Bishop Ludden High School where he took MVP honors in 1977, two years after he won the Onondaga County Junior Championship and a year following his qualification for the U.S. Junior Championship. Roy also took runner-up honors in the 1977 Ashe Memorial, Syracuse District and Herald Am contests. In 1978, he won the Ashe and earned his first of five District Player of the Year awards.

Roy had another big year in 1979. He took first in the Ashe, the Herald Am and won District Player of the Year again. He was runner-up in the NY State Amateur and qualified for his first of six U.S. Amateur events.

In the 1980's, Roy became a fixture in major local tournaments and in college competition. As a student at the Universi-

ty of South Florida, Roy won a bevy of Florida titles and earned a slot on the Sun Belt Conference all-conference golf team three years straight. His crowning college golf achievement was the Florida State Championship.

Roy was named both Golfer of the Year and Player of the Year by the District Golf Association in 1981, an honor granted to only one other golfer, hall of famer John Ward. The 1980s also saw Roy win the NY State Amateur, the Emmett Kelly Masters (4 times), runner-up Porter Cup honors and the CNY Open.

In 1983, Roy turned pro. He qualified for the PGA Tour and the U.S. Open at Oakmont. He was runner-up in the 1986 Cosco Open and the Rhode Island Open and came in third in the New York State Open. He also won one Charity Classic. In 1989, he played in the U.S. Open at Oak Hill. In 1993, he decided to regain his amateur status and turned in his pro card. From 1998 to 2006, he has won over 16 events, including a 2006 sweep of the Ashe, District, Post-Standard and Player of the Year honors, the first player to do so in local golfing history.


Among his special achievements over the years: Four-time District Best Ball winner;

Seven-time Bellevue Country Club champion; four-time State Mid-Am winner and owner of the Bellevue course record with a 62.

Len Rausch



Len Rausch was a superb two-sport athlete in both high school and college.

Basketball and baseball were sports he excelled in. At Bishop Ludden High School,

he was the featured performer for Greater Syracuse Sports Hall of Fame Coach Gerry Wilcox. At Ludden, Len was a two-time All City selection, Post-Standard All City in 1987 and All-State honoree. He led the Gaelic Knights to the State Class A Championship game, multiple Section III team titles and was nominated for the prestigious McDonald's All American High

School Team. He also starred for the Ludden baseball team.

His college career at Le Moyne College brought him to higher levels of success. He held the Le Moyne record from 1991, broken this year, as all-time leading scorer (1,876 points) and all-time rebounder (1,151). He is No. 3 for the Dolphins for made field goals and free throws and No. 5 for assists (509) and steals (172). Len was the Mideast Conference Rookie of the Year and was the first player named all-conference in all four years (three as first team). He was the Conference Player of the Year his senior season and Division II NABC Third Team All-American.

Len also played baseball at LeMoyne in 1989 and 1990, including a trip to the Division I NCAA Regional Finals, only one pitch away from competing in the College World Series.

In 1991 he toured with the Harlem Globetrotters as a member of the Boston Shamrocks. Len was inducted into the LeMoyne College Hall of Fame in 2001. He has, since 2000, become a high school and college basketball official. He also competes as a top local golfer, being a member of the Mitchell Cup Team in 2003, 2004 and 2005. In 2005, Len was District Amateur Champion. He also coaches youth basketball and baseball.

Bob Ulrich



I was truly fortunate growing up in a big family, great parents (George & Jane) with six active, athletic kids. I remember following my older brothers, first Gary at St. Mary's and then

Dave at Don Bosco, both played multiple sports. Dave set basketball records at Bosco, 3-year starter, 2 state championships and held their scoring record for 28 years. Played at Boston College all 4 years.

So ... you can see where I got "toughened up" in our backyard hoop in Rutherford, NJ all through my grammar school years. We relocated from Jersey to Syracuse in October, my freshman year. It was a big transition but felt welcomed immediately at Ludden. Of course, one of the first things to find out was "what time are pick-up games in the gym starting?" I quickly heard of The Green Machine and their tremendous accomplishments (remarkably like Don Bosco) and wanted to follow in that success.

I was also fortunate to play for two outstanding Hall of Fame coaches, Jerry Wil-

cox, and Terry Quigley. These two toughened me up just like my brothers. Smart, fiery, and competitive, they motivated us to always improve. As a matter of fact, Mark Farrell and I were co-captains of Coach Wilcox's first varsity team, 1974. And....what a year it was!

Our '74 team won it all that year. Finished 21-2 and beat CBA 62-55 in playoff game for the Cities League Championship in front of a sold-out crowd at LeMoyne College. Coach Wilcox and I talk about this still today. We went on to win our Sectional game, played in the War Memorial to finish our outstanding year.

I was honored/awarded that magical year:

- Led/tied league in scoring 21.2 ppg.
- Most Outstanding player/1st team all-star
- Hardcourt Player of Year Award
- BL President's Most Outstanding Athlete
- 5th Team All-State
- All-American (Honorable mention)

Baseball was my second love. I had always played in Jersey, too. I was a starting pitcher for 3 years at Ludden. Our '73 team won the sectional championship 4-0

at the Syracuse Chiefs stadium. Coach Wilcox was our head coach that year. I remember how great it was to pitch from that mound to this day.

I was on the All-Star team in '73 & '74 as a pitcher, played on multiple all-star summer leagues. I was also featured as TV 5 Athlete of the Week twice for baseball; had several offers to play baseball in college, but basketball was my first love.

Went on to play basketball for Potsdam State and had a solid career there.

Mark Stanley Lacey, age 54 of Ridgefield, CT passed away from a brief yet brutal battle with Rhabdomyosarcoma on Friday, May 14, 2021. Mark had many exceptional qualities chief among them was the love he had for his family, his unfaltering faith in God, and the genuine kindness that he showed to everyone he met.

He touched the hearts and souls of many people during his life and leaves behind a legacy of love and compassion. 
Two of Coach Quigley's players – Mark Wadach and Phil Harlow (both Greater Syracuse Sports Hall of Famers and All-State performers for the team) were on the team. Both players spoke of the togetherness on their special 18 player team that included Dan Craver, Terry Ianniello, Pete Tartaro, John O'Hearn, Bob Bachman, and Ken McKinley in the top eight that won games by an average of 21 points and defeated four-time defending NYS Diocesan champ Utica Notre Dame by 30 points in the playoffs on its way to a truly remarkable undefeated season.

"He got this team that was so good that they just started going through everybody like a hot knife through butter," said M.C. Antil, an author who wrote "Floor Burns," a book on the finest Syracuse All-City high school championship ever played in 1967. The team was saluted as the Greater Syracuse Sports Hall of Fame's "Team of Honor" in 2015.

Quigley passed from us on the afternoon of Sept. 25 after suffering a heart attack, almost a month before his 81st birthday.
