**Where's one place you haven't been to that you'd like to visit and why?**

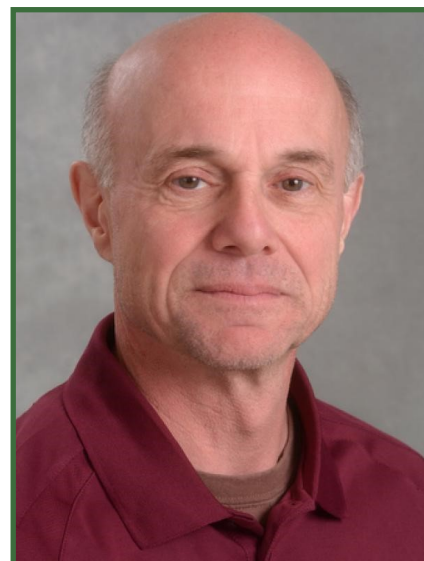
Haven't been to the Grand Canyon but would like to go.

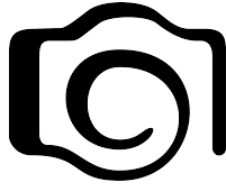

### COVID-19 Testing

Any student in Onondaga County who has symptoms of illness can now get tested for Covid-19 at NBT Bank Stadium without cost to their family.

A mobile van from Upstate University Hospital will be at the stadium 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday to administer the tests. Nurses will collect saliva samples (not nasal swabs) from the students that will be processed at Upstate within 24 hours.

Students or their guardians can make appointments to get tested by calling 315-464-2582 and selecting option 4. Any kid under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

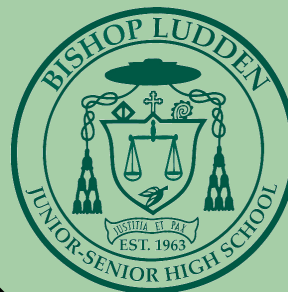
### From the Director of Tuition:

# SCRIP PROGRAM: GIVE A GIFT CARD AND EARN MONEY TOWARD TUITION!



Do you shop at Target? Walmart? Amazon? JCPenney? Marshalls? Kohls? Barnes & Noble? Do you eat at Applebees? Olive Garden? Panera Bread? Cheesecake Factory? Subway? Dunkin' Donuts? Are you planning a big home improvement project with Lowe's or Home Depot? How about making vacation plans with Airbnb? American Airlines? Hilton Hotels? Carnival Cruise Lines? Disney?

SCRIP gives you the opportunity to earn credit towards your student's tuition when you make your normal purchases from hundreds of retailers

## So, how does it work?

Think of it as substitute money. When you purchase a SCRIP, you're purchasing a normal gift card to use just like cash. But with every card you purchase, you're earning money back towards the cost of tuition at Ludden. SCRIP cards can be used for groceries, clothing, gifts, gasoline, vacations and more! Extended family and friends can also order through your student, earning your family even more credit toward tuition!

## How does buying a SCRIP generate revenue?

You order your SCRIP gift cards through the school and pay full face value for them. Bishop Ludden is able to buy SCRIP from hundreds of local and nationwide retailers through the Great Lakes Scrip Center at a discount. The discount, which varies from 1.5% to 25%, is returned to you as tuition credit for the following school year.

For example, if you purchase a \$50 gift card from a retailer that is offering a 10% discount, you have already saved \$5 on next year's tuition bill.

If you're planning a shopping trip to Target or a dinner at Cheesecake Factory, plan ahead and shop with SCRIP! Earn money back in the process — it really adds up. Families have earned hundreds of dollars towards their tuition bills.

## How do I order SCRIP?

Download and complete an order form. There is a one time \$20 set-up fee paid annually, which covers shipping costs. Send the order to school with your student on the due date (always on a Monday) and the rest is up to our SCRIP coordinator. Your SCRIP order is returned to you or your student at school the Friday of the same week.

In addition to his current work at Bishop Ludden, Melvin has been a Christian minister for 21 years. He is a chaplain at Syracuse University and Le Moyne College. Academically, Melvin is a graduate of Roberts Wesleyan College (obtaining a BSW), Syracuse University (obtaining a MSW), and is a Licensed Masters Social Worker. Melvin has past work experience as a school social worker with Syracuse City School District and coordinator of multicultural recruitment at Le Moyne College.

### Application Process

The application process is about to be under way for our seniors. Please make sure your child is researching the requirements needed for each individual school and watching deadlines. Teachers need at least two weeks notice in order to write a letter of recommendation. Students also need to request a transcript using the orange transcript request form that was handed out in Religion class at least two weeks before a deadline date.

Speaking of college financial aid ... on **Sept. 29 at 6:30pm**, Mrs. Schoeneck will be hosting a **Senior Parent/Financial Aid Night in the Cafe**. This night will be very informative because we will be going over the application process as well as hearing from Mark Hill, director of financial aid at SUNY ESF, about how to fill out the FAFSA.

On Oct. 1, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid opens up to students and their parents. Now is the time to apply for financial aid. First go to [www.studentaid.ed.gov](http://www.studentaid.ed.gov) to sign up for a Federal Student Aid ID) for parent and student. Scroll to the bottom of the page and click on "The FSA ID." Then go to [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov) to fill out the FAFSA application. If you have questions when filling out the FAFSA, feel free to call Mrs. Schoeneck in the Counseling Office. It is recommended that FAFSA applications be filed by Feb. 15 for the best financial aid possible. Some colleges also require that a student fills out a CSS Profile, which is the financial aid application for certain private schools. You can do this on the College Board's website, [www.collegeboard.org](http://www.collegeboard.org). It will have a list of all the schools that require this application.

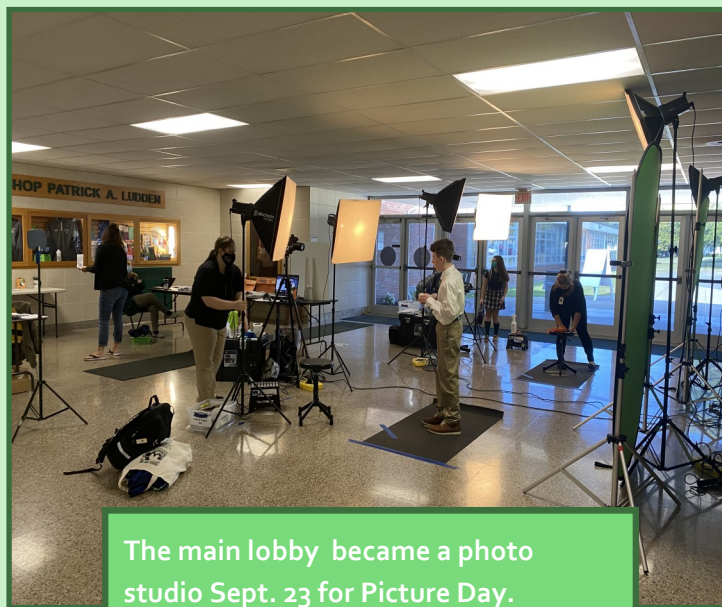

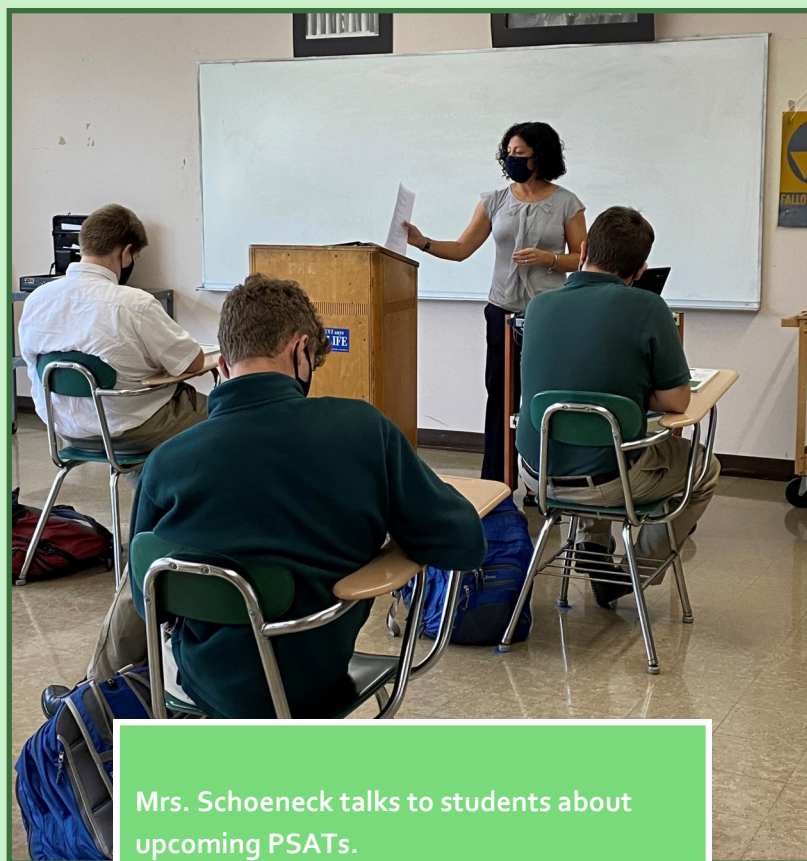

It's a scene which has played out numerous times before, an athlete at home, bouncing a ball to pass the time. Except for Jasmine Cuffee, she is bouncing with a purpose.

"I don't think COVID-19 will dictate (my future and) where I go," Cuffee says as she continues to spike her volleyball into the side of her home. "I've worked hard every year and I hope that shows coaches, even through COVID, I am still willing to work hard."

Though working hard looks a bit different these days. And on this particular fall evening, this Bishop Ludden volleyball star is preparing for her future.

Dr. Adeline Fagan was a 2010 graduate of Bishop Ludden. She died Sept. 19 after battling COVID-19 for two-and-a-half months. Adeline is remembered by many in our school—staff and students alike. # Adeline Fagan, Class of 2010 (1992 - 2020)

Adeline Marie Fagan, MD, of La Fayette, NY, passed away September 19, 2020, after contracting COVID-19. Adeline was born in Syracuse, NY, on February 4, 1992, the second of four daughters of Mary Jane Abt-Fagan and Brant Fagan.

Adeline grew up in La Fayette, where at the age of five she ran around the house with a toy stethoscope around her neck. At age 11, Adeline developed a neurological disease and became confined to a wheelchair. A visit to the orthopedist to diagnose her illness cemented her desire to become a physician, after he took the time to explain his diagnosis directly to Adeline so she could understand.

Throughout her life, Adeline loved and valued education. She attended Bishop Ludden High School, where in three short years she made many friends, played varsity lacrosse, and was elected Class President. She attended Saint Joseph's University (SJU) in Philadelphia, PA, graduating Phi Beta Kappa with a Bachelor of Science in Biology. Adeline was a charter member of the SJU chapter of Phi Sigma Pi National Honor Fraternity. After graduation, Adeline took a gap year before entering medical school. During that time, she became a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) in order to care for and learn more about patients in the hospital. She received her medical training at Jacobs School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences at SUNY University at Buffalo, where she made it a point to meet and memorize the names of all 144 students in her class. There, she made lifelong friends with her radiant smile and cheerful manner.

Always intent on helping others, Adeline traveled to Haiti on medical outreach trips during each of her four years in medical school, more than any other student in her class. In her last medical school rotation, she found OB/GYN, a discipline that married working with women and babies, her love of helping others, a need for patient education and surgical procedures. Adeline moved to Houston, TX for residency where she quickly

blossomed as a caring and dedicated OB/GYN. She worked in both a hospital and a clinic for an underserved population.

In addition to being a doctor and helping others, Adeline loved her extended family, friends, music, and her dog, Ruby. She always looked forward to holidays and birthdays, a time to sit and laugh with the rest of the family. Game nights with her school friends were a welcome diversion from the stress. 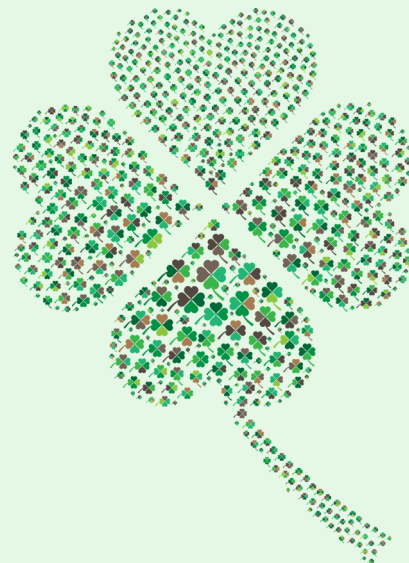

# Crouse Nursing Student Hero: Life Saved by a Nurse in Training

How many nursing students can say they've saved a life?

At least one who we're proud to say is one of our own: Vincenzia Diglio, a Syracuse native and Bishop Ludden High School grad who's a second-year student nurse in the Pomeroy College of Nursing at Crouse Hospital.

Vincenzia happened to be caring for a 91-year-old patient on our 5 South Irving unit who began exhibiting stroke-like symptoms. "Her head was turned far to the right side of her body, with a significantly evident right-side facial droop," recalled Vincenzia. "Her eyes were closed, and she was non-responsive to vocal and physical stimulation."

### Quick Thinking and Action

Vincenzia immediately alerted her clinical instructor, Cathie Aber, who activated a Code M (a change in a patient's condition), which was converted to a Code B (stroke alert) by our SWAT team, which intervenes during medical emergencies in the hospital. Thanks to Vincenzia's quick thinking and intervention, the patient was brought to our Neuro Interventional Suite, where she was diagnosed as having a large vessel occlusion. The clot was removed, and within two hours, the patient was relieved of her stroke symptoms and on her way to recovery.

"Vincenzia very much saved this patient's life," said Evan Belanger, DNP, FNP-BC, RNFA, who is Director of Neurosciences, Intensive Care, VAT, SWAT, and our Comprehensive Stroke Center. Being a student nurse has been rewarding for Vincenzia. She says even doing the 'smallest' things to make patients feel better makes her feel good. "I haven't yet processed this. But it's an indescribable feeling to think I saved someone's life," she said.

### PCON Pride

"On behalf of the entire college faculty and staff, we could not be more proud of Vincenzia for the awareness and swift action she displayed while caring for her patient. She used her education and clinical skills to effectively put theory to practice," said Patty Morgan, dean of the Pomeroy College of Nursing.

Belanger and Morgan both acknowledged the care, compassion

and critical thinking skills our student nurses bring to the hospital each day.

Students in the college complete extensive clinical hours in the hospital, of which Vincenzia says she has appreciated having the early hands-on experience with patients in the hospital that our college provides.


"I've had a positive experience with the staff at Crouse in the clinical setting. The nurses are willing to teach, and are accepting of having students incorporated into their day," says "Chenzie," as she's known to family and friends.

### Students Making a Difference

While acknowledging Vincenzia during a class via Zoom recently, Interim Chief Nursing Officer Lynne Shopiro told the students, "You make a difference. This is a great example of how you use your resources."

Florence Nightingale once said: "The most important practical lesson that can be given to nurses is to teach them what to observe." While Vincenzia isn't sure where her career in nursing might lead her – she's interested in possibly working with kids, in a trauma setting or in the OR – it's clear she has mastered this vital lesson.
